Dear Mr. Ankeny:

This will acknowledge receipt of your recent letter, which reached me on September 19, 1974.

I have read your letter with great care and appreciate your taking the time to express your views so candidly to me.

The United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America is a church governed by a representative form of government, similar to that which we know in civil life. The several presbyteries of the Church elect delegates to the General Assembly, known as commissioners. These commissioners are one-half ruling elders and one-half ordained ministers. The decisions of this preceded representative body are binding upon me in my capacity as an officer of the General Assembly.

Many of the actions which trouble you were taken by the 186th General Assembly (1974), meeting in Louisville, Kentucky, or by prior General Assemblies. These decisions are not binding upon the general membership of the Church, but the general membership should give them serious consideration to ascertain whether or not the commissioners elected to the General Assembly have properly understood the Gospel of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, and its application to the problems of the world in which the Church seeks to witness.

At a meeting of the General Assembly the Stated Clerk serves as parlimentarian. This is required by the <u>Manual</u> of the General Assembly. Also contained in the <u>Manual</u> are the Standing Rules of the General Assembly. Standing Rule 20 provides for the appointment of a Committee on Conference. The Standing Rule reads as follows:

"COMMITTEE ON CONFERENCE. As soon as possible after the election of the assembly committees, the Moderator shall appoint a Committee on Conference consisting of eight commissioners, four ordained ministers and four ruling elders, including one member of the Committee on Bills and Overtures, and such members of other assembly committees and of the Assembly at large as to afford adequate representation. The Moderator shall designate one of these or an additional member whom the Moderator shall appoint to be the chairperson of the Assembly Committee on Conference. The duties of the Committee on Conference are:

(a) To be informed regarding the subjects being considered by the several assembly committees and to advise the chairpersons of those committees which are considering the same or related subjects.

- (b) To confer with persons who may wish to communicate with the General Assembly regarding the time and manner in which the concerns of such persons shall be brought to the attention of the commissioners.
- (c) To make proposals regarding these matters to the General Assembly."

The Moderator of the 186th General Assembly (1974), the Rev. Robert C. Lamar, appointed a Committee on Conference.

This committee received a request that Mr. Cesar Chavez address the Assembly. It deliberated regarding the matter and recommended to the Assembly that it hear Mr. Chavez. The Assembly discussed the matter and voted by an overwhelming majority to assign a period on its docket to hear the presentation. There were several commissioners who urged that the contrary view to that anticipated from Mr. Chavez be presented. However, these commissioners did not present the name of any person whem they wished to hear, and no application was formally made to the Committee on Conference that such provision be made. Consequently, the Committee on Conference did not present any recommendation to the floor of the Assembly requesting that time be provided to hear a rebuttal to Mr. Chavez' presentation.

The Stated Clerk of the General Assembly does not have the power to prevent any such matter being heard by the General Assembly, and I had no opportunity to exercise such a function, if it had been mine at the recent meeting in Louisville.

If you have further specific questions, I shall be happy to respond to them.

Dear Mr. House:

I am responding to the question which you recorded on DIAL-YOUR-QUESTION September 20, 1974.

Your question reflects a misunderstanding regarding both the role and the actual practice relating to the Stated Clerk's responsibility as parlimentarian at the meetings of the General Assembly. Let me say at the outset that I had neither the power nor did I refuse to allow a rebuttal to the address which Cesar Chavez made on the floor of the General Assembly at Louisville.

Standing Rule 20 of the General Assembly provides as follows:

"COMMITTEE ON CONFERENCE. As soon as possible after the election of the assembly committees, the Moderator shall appoint a Committee on Conference consisting of eight commissioners, four ordained ministers and four ruling elders, including one member of the Committee on Bills and Overtures, and such members of other assembly committees and of the Assembly at large as to afford adequate representation. The Moderator shall designate one of these or an additional member whom the Moderator shall appoint to be the chairperson of the Assembly Committee on Conference. The duties of the Committee on Conference are:

- (a) To be informed regarding the subjects being considered by the several assembly committees and to advise the chairpersons of those committees which are considering the same or related subjects.
- (b) To confer with persons who may wish to communicate with the General Assembly regarding the time and manner in which the concernedof such persons shall be brought to the attention of the commissioners.
- (c) To make proposals regarding these matters to the General Assembly."

In accordance with this Rule, the Rev. Robert C. Lamar, Moderator of the 186th General Assembly (1974), appointed a Committee on Conference.

The Committee on Conference received a request that Cesar Chavez address the Assembly. After deliberation, the Committee brought to the floor

of the Assembly a recommendation that the Assembly hear Mr. Chavez. The Assembly itself voted by an overwhelming margin to assign a period on its docket to hear this address, and Mr. Chavez was invited to come to Louisville, and did appear before the Assembly as scheduled.

Several Commissioners expressed a desire to have a person or persons expressing a different point of view address the Assembly, However, when these persons approached the Committee on Conference, they were not in a pecition to propose a particular individual to make this presentation. Hence, the Committee was never presented with a request that a particular individual address the Assembly and brought no recommendation regarding this request to the floor of the Assembly.
